The first five months of this year have been filled to overflowing with purposeful activity in our church. Perhaps it always seems busy from my perspective, but this year has been especially so in a good way.

Our search committee is prayerfully seeking our very first Minister with Community. Our *ad hoc* facilities assessment committee is in the midst of a thorough evaluation of the Lewis Building, both current use and condition and future hopes and possibilities. The church conference approved a few special mission grants recommended by the church council and the council is still considering others. We are working on a new Pictorial Directory. We had another successful Kay Huggins Classic, raising several thousand dollars for the Day Mission Fund and discovering that Dan Day has a hidden talent for putting (so long as someone else helps him line up the putt). The deacons are expanding their involvement in congregational care. And Trey Davis and the youth have organized yet another highly successful auction.

And all of this is on top of two mission trips to Honduras, a churchwide retreat, a Celtic Vespers Service at the Gregg Museum, a Family Promise week, and the dental bus ministry, not to mention weekly Sunday School and worship, Wednesday night programs, music and missions activities (with year-end programs), youth programs, the amazing work of the clothing ministry, etc., etc. It takes more than a village to be the church and do all that the church does, at least a church like ours. And the good news is we have a wonderful cast of characters who are willing to do whatever needs to be done to fulfill our mission.

As an RA leader and Sunday School teacher, I have the privilege of watching the children and youth in our church grow in their faith. From RA/GA mission projects to Youth mission trips, opportunities to serve others as an expression of our faith are part of the fabric of who we are and what we do.

As part of the Heck-Jones Offering, we have the opportunity to celebrate and support a young man and young woman who grew up in our church and have now dedicated their careers to mission work.

Alex Thompson works for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes as Director of Operations in our area. The mission of FCA is “To lead every coach and athlete into a growing relationship with Jesus Christ and His church.” Alex also volunteers as a leader in our youth group. The Heck-Jones Offering will support his work in the FCA ministry.

Elizabeth Morris Brenneman and her husband Josh serve with his family’s non-profit Next Step Storm. Many of our youth and college mission trips have been to Alabama to work with this group, whose mission is to rebuild homes after natural disasters such as tornados in Alabama and hurricanes in Texas. We are sending 50 youth to work with them again this June, and will have the opportunity to reconnect with Elizabeth and her family. This organization relies on offerings such as the Heck-Jones Offering to fund their critical work.

Through teaching them in Sunday School, leading them on Wednesday nights, chaperoning, volunteering, and encouraging them with smiles in the lobby, we have all had a hand in “training up” these two amazing individuals. Ironman Race Causing Less Disruption

This year’s Ironman Race on Sunday, June 3, will create less disruption than in previous years. According to the Raleigh Police, streets around the church will remain open. The only traffic change will involve a detour from McDowell Street to MLK Blvd to Person Street. Dashboard passes will not be necessary.

Offering Envelope Options Available

First, a big thank you for the response of our congregation last fall to help us purchase only the number of offering envelopes that are needed. We were able to reduce our boxed envelopes order by 300 boxes. Of those 300 giving units (family or individual), 150 giving units chose an envelope option that costs us considerably less. Another 150 giving units simply did not need envelopes due to automatic drafts, VANCO payments, credit card payments, PayPal, or choosing to use an envelope from the pew.

It is time to place our 2019 envelope order. If you are happy with your envelope plan, then you need to do nothing. If you wish to adjust your current plan or wish to start receiving envelopes, please contact Wayne Hager at whager@fbcraleigh.org. You may choose from these envelope options:

- A box including envelopes for 52 weekly budget offerings and special offering envelopes (Fellowship Fund, CBF Global Mission Offering, Heck-Jones Offering, and State Missions Offering);
- 26 envelopes for budget offerings (with or without special offering envelopes);
- 12 envelopes for budget offerings (with or without special offering envelopes).

though I do need it, but to underscore the progress we are making toward our vision of future ministry and to highlight the number of people who are making this progress possible.
