About our Worship: Today is the Third Sunday After Epiphany, a season in which we celebrate the good news that God extends love to the whole world. Today's readings proclaim this sacred truth in specific ways. Isaiah envisions a day when light will shine in the darkness and this light will include Galilee of the nations, it will go far beyond the heart of Israel's national life. Matthew describes Jesus' ministry as the fulfillment of this vision, as he goes to Galilee to call disciples and begin his ministry. The Apostle Paul, then, tells the church in Corinth exactly how God's love for the world will be made clear - through the message of the cross. We celebrate this good news through glorious sacred music, we pray for light to shine on our world today, and we offer our gifts to help spread this light. The sermon, which is rooted primarily in the reading from Matthew, examines the presence of danger in Jesus' ministry and ours, naming the fact that there are times to run from danger and times to face it as we live as Christ's disciples in this world of many needs.


