

About our Worship: Today is Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and all that this sacred event implies—the victory of life over death, love over fear, hope over despair. While our celebration is dramatically different this year, as we remain in isolation out of a desire to limit the spread of COVID-19, the good news of the Risen Christ remains the same and thus we celebrate our great hope in eternity. As always, we celebrate through the gift of sacred music-today hearing our majestic organ, singing a great Easter hymn, and hearing a quartet with piano and trumpet. We will hear a personal Easter story from our longest standing member, Bill Simpson, who joined FBC Raleigh on March 29, 1936. And we are guided by texts that point to our hope. The reading from Jeremiah provides a hopeful word for our nation, as the prophet declares God's vision of a time when the people will return from exile and dwell again in the land. In like manner, we look forward to the time when we will return from a kind of self-imposed exile to our normal rhythm of life in this land. The reading from Acts presents Peter's sermon to a gathering of Gentiles, including a clear word about the centrality of Jesus' death and resurrection to Christian faith. The reading from Matthew tells the story of two women named Mary encountering an angel, discovering an empty tomb, and ultimately meeting the Risen Christ. The sermon, which is rooted primarily in the reading from Matthew but makes reference to the other texts, explores the ways in which the good news of Easter has been celebrated by the church throughout the ages—in times of war and peace, sickness and health, persecution and establishment. Significant challenges have often altered the manner in which we celebrate our hope, as significant challenges do today, but no challenge has or ever will stop the celebration. Nothing can change the basic reality we celebrate—that Christ has risen, indeed, alleluia and thus hope will always prevail.

³⁴Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. ²And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. ⁴For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. ⁵But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. ⁶He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. ⁷Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." ⁸So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."
