

THE CHURCH IN WORSHIP THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

September 13, 2020 Eleven o'clock

About our Worship: Today is the Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost, part of what is called Ordinary Time in the Christian year. It is a season to ponder our possibilities for growth as individuals and as a church. Thus, the liturgical color is green, and we wear our community stoles which were assembled by church members, using materials contributed by church members. These stoles offer a visible sign of our yearning for growth as a community of faith. We continue with readings from Exodus, Romans, and Matthew, all of which challenge us to grow in different ways, and we begin with the words of Psalm 114, which echo the mighty acts of God revealed in the Exodus story, and sing a hymn of praise to this God. All of the texts address a common concern — how communities manage significant differences and outright conflict. The human tendency is to divide the world into categories of *us* and *them*, but the biblical calling is to welcome those who are different, just as God does, and to forgive those who harm us. The sermon explores our calling to move past *us* and *them* thinking, a calling that seems particularly needful in this highly divisive time. In response to this challenge, we sing of a reality which we have not yet reached but to which we aspire, "In Christ there is no east or west — he breaks all barriers down; by Christ redeemed, by Christ possessed, in Christ we live as one." May it be so!

PEOPLE: The mountains skipped like rams, the hills like lambs.


LEADER: Why is it, O sea, that you flee? O Jordan, that you turn back?

The Hebrew Bible Exodus 14:19–31 Michael Hood

¹⁹The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. ²⁰It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night.

²¹Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. ²²The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. ²³The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. ²⁴At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. ²⁵He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, "Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt." ²⁶Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." ²⁷So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. ²⁸The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. ²⁹But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. ³⁰Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. ³¹Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

PEOPLE: Thanks be to God.

The Christian Testament Romans 14:1–12

¹Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of quarreling over opinions. ²Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. ³Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who eat; for God has welcomed them. ⁴Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. ⁵Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. ⁶Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God. ¬We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. ³If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. °For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. ¹OWhy do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. ¹¹For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God." ¹2So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

The Gospel Matthew 18:21–35

²¹Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" 22Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. ²³"For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. ²⁴When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; ²⁵and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. ²⁶So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' 29Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' 30But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. ³¹When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. 32Then his lord summoned him and said to him, You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. 33Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' 34And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. ³⁵So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."
