

THE CHURCH IN WORSHIP SECOND SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY

January 17, 2021 Eleven o'clock

About our Worship: Today is the second Sunday after the Epiphany, a season in which we ponder our calling to share God's light and love with the whole world. It is also the weekend in which our nation honors the prophetic ministry of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. These two themes are tightly connected and woven into this service at a time in our national life which seems to be crying out for light and love and for some prophetic word. We read texts of prophetic calling, sing hymns that call us to a larger view of Christian life, and offer prayers for a world much in need of God's grace and truth. The sermon, which is rooted in the reading from 1 Samuel, explores the nature of prophetic calling and how we discern who the genuine prophets are. In a time of many loud, competing voices, how do we know who is speaking for God? Many times only history can say for sure, but scripture provides clues to guide us in our discernment. We identify and ponder those clues today as we seek to honor God with all that we have and are, and listen for God's voice.

The Trinity Chimes

The Call to Worship (responsive)

from Psalm 139

LEADER: O God, you have searched me and known me.

PEOPLE: You know when I sit down and when I rise up; you discern my thoughts from far

away.

LEADER: You search out my path and my lying down, and are acquainted with all my ways.

PEOPLE: Even before a word is on my tongue, you know it completely.

LEADER: You hem me in, behind and before, and lay your hand upon me.

PEOPLE: Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is so high that I cannot attain it.

LEADER: Where can I go from your spirit? Or where can I flee from your presence?

PEOPLE: If I ascend to heaven, you are there; if I make my bed in Sheol, you are there.

LEADER: If I take the wings of the morning and settle at the farthest limits of the sea,

PEOPLE: even there your hand shall lead me, and your right hand shall hold me fast.

LEADER: If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light around me become night,"

PEOPLE: even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is as bright as the day, for

darkness is as light to you.

LEADER: Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts.

PEOPLE: See if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

LISTENING FOR GOD'S WORD

The Hebrew Bible 1 Samuel 3:1–20 Michael Hood

¹Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. ²At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; ³the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. ⁴Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" ⁵and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. ⁶The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." ¬Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. ³The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. ¹Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. ¹0Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening."

¹¹Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. ¹²On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. ¹³For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever, for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. ¹⁴Therefore I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice or offering forever." ¹⁵Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. ¹⁶But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." ¹⁷Eli said, "What was it that he told you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that he told you." ¹⁸So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then he said, "It is the Lord; let him do what seems good to him."

¹⁹As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. ²⁰And all Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

PEOPLE: Thanks be to God.

The Christian Testament 1 Corinthians 6:12–20

12"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. ¹³"Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. ¹⁴And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. ¹⁵Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! ¹⁶Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." ¹⁷But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. ¹⁸Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. ¹⁹Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? ²⁰For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

The Litany for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day (responsive)²

LEADER: We remember the conviction of Martin Luther King Jr. that "freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed."

PEOPLE: Therefore, let us pray for courage and determination for those who are oppressed.

LEADER: We remember Dr. King's warning that "a negative peace which is the absence of tension" is less than "a positive peace which is the presence of justice."

PEOPLE: Therefore, let us pray that those who work for peace in our world may cry out first for justice.

LEADER: We remember Dr. King's insight that "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly."

PEOPLE: Therefore, let us pray that we may see nothing in isolation, but may know ourselves bound to one another and to all people under heaven.

LEADER: We remember Dr. King's lament that "the contemporary church is often a weak, ineffectual voice with an uncertain sound. It is so often the arch supporter of the status quo. Far from being disturbed by the presence of the church, the power structure of the average community is consoled by the church's silent and often vocal sanction of things as they are."

PEOPLE: Therefore, let us pray that neither this congregation nor any congregation of Christ's people may be silent in the face of wrong, but that we may be disturbers of the status quo when that is God's call to us.

LEADER: We remember Dr. King's hope that "dark clouds of racial prejudice will soon pass away and the deep fog of misunderstanding will be lifted from our fear-drenched communities and in some not-too-distant tomorrow the radiant stars of love and brotherhood will shine over our great nation with all their scintillating beauty."

The Lord's Prayer


Our Father,


LEADER: This is the Gospel of Christ.

An ordained Baptist minister with a PhD from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, he is the award-winning author of *Southern Civil Religions in Conflict, A Fire You Can't Put Out, Macon Black and White*, and most recently, *Eavesdropping on the Most Segregated Hour: A City's Clergy Reflect on Racial Reconciliation*. We will build on the discussion with Dr. Manis in February through a two-part series where we will discuss the book/movie *Just Mercy*.
