# THE CHURCH IN WORSHIP EASTER

April 4, 2021 Eleven o'clock

About our Worship: Today is Easter Sunday, the day we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and all that this sacred event implies — the victory of life over death, love over fear, hope over despair. This year's celebration feels a bit more profound since we have endured a year of suffering with COVID-19 and are just beginning to see the light of hope arising with the arrival of vaccines. Some of us will worship in-person at Fletcher Park while others will join a virtual celebration live streamed on our YouTube channel, but in both ways we celebrate the Good News of Easter with the hope of our own good news on the horizon. As always, we celebrate through the gift of sacred music, the reading of familiar texts, and our prayers for the hope of resurrection to transform our world. The sermon provides a first-person reflection from one of the characters in the traditional Easter reading from John 20 who brings us a genuine word of hope for our time. Yet again this year, even after a year of laboring under the weight of a pandemic, we are still able to say that nothing can change the basic reality we celebrate today — Christ has risen, indeed, alleluia — and thus hope will always prevail.

¹Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, ²through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain. ³For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, ⁴and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, ⁵and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. ⁶Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ⁶Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. ⁶For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹oBut by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. ¹¹Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

The Gospel John 20:1–18

¹Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." ³Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. ⁴The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. 

She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." <sup>14</sup>When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. <sup>15</sup>Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." <sup>16</sup>Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). <sup>17</sup>Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father.
