

November 7, 2021

About our Worship: We celebrate All Saints Day today. Technically it is November 1, but along with many other churches, we move the recognition to the first Sunday in November if it does not fall on a Sunday. An ancient Christian celebration dating back at least to the fifth century C.E., it is the day we remember all the saints of the church universal, especially the members of this church family we have lost during the past year, and we celebrate their place in eternity. Glorious sacred music from two Requiems, one by John Rutter and the other by Gabriel Fauré, set the mood for this service. The texts, hymns, liturgy, and prayers all point to the nature of eternal hope. The sermon explores the imagery in John 11 of Lazarus being unbound as a sign of our need and hope — Christ comes to set us free from all that binds us. The celebration of communion enables us to catch a glimpse of eternity, to taste and see that both God and life are good.


