

July 17, 2022 Eleven o'clock

About our Worship: Today is the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost, part of what is called Ordinary Time in the Christian year. The lectionary texts explore an array of themes — the centrality of Christ and the nature of faithfulness, the roles of service and proclaiming the word, the relationship between right worship and right living, and the significance of hospitality. Various worship elements will reflect each of these themes, but the sermon will explore the readings from Genesis and Luke, in particular the view of women in ancient times, as revealed in these texts, and how this view compares to contemporary views. We would like to think we have embraced a more egalitarian view of gender, but that perspective is still in large part aspirational. In many ways, as is often the case, Jesus is still ahead of us.

reproach against their neighbors;


PEOPLE: in whose eyes the wicked are despised, but who honor those who fear God; who

The Hebrew Bible Genesis 18:1–10 Hayden James

¹The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. ²He looked up and saw three men standing near him. When he saw them, he ran from the tent entrance to meet them, and bowed down to the ground. ³He said, "My lord, if I find favor with you, do not pass by your servant. ⁴Let a little water be brought, and wash your feet, and rest yourselves under the tree. ⁵Let me bring a little bread, that you may refresh yourselves, and after that you may pass on—since you have come to your servant." So they said, "Do as you have said." ⁶And Abraham hastened into the tent to Sarah, and said, "Make ready quickly three measures of choice flour, knead it, and make cakes." ¬Abraham ran to the herd, and took a calf, tender and good, and gave it to the servant, who hastened to prepare it. ®Then he took curds and milk and the calf that he had prepared, and set it before them; and he stood by them under the tree while they ate.

⁹They said to him, "Where is your wife Sarah?" And he said, "There, in the tent." ¹⁰Then one said, "I will surely return to you in due season, and your wife Sarah shall have a son." And Sarah was listening at the tent entrance behind him.

The Christian Testament Colossians 1:15–28

¹⁵He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; ¹⁶for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, 20 and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. ²¹And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, ²²he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him—23provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel. ²⁴I am now rejoicing in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am completing what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church. ²⁵I became its servant according to God's commission that was given to me for you, to make the word of God fully known, ²⁶the mystery that has been hidden throughout the ages and generations but has now been revealed to his saints. ²⁷To them God chose to make known how great among the Gentiles are the riches of the glory of this mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory. ²⁸It is he whom we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone in all wisdom, so that we may present everyone mature in Christ.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

PEOPLE: Thanks be to God.
