

THE SECOND SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY

January 15, 2023 Eleven o'clock

About our Worship: Today is the Second Sunday after the Epiphany, part of a season in which we celebrate and reflect upon the manifestation of God's love for the whole world. This love permeates all of our texts today as Isaiah speaks of the prophetic calling to be a light to all nations, 1 Corinthians summarizes the saving work of Christ, and John describes Jesus' calling of his first disciples who will help extend God's reign of justice and love. This is also the weekend in which our nation honors the prophetic ministry of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a fellow Baptist who modelled God's all-inclusive love in a way that still challenges us to this day. The service connects these two themes with music, prayer, and liturgy. The sermon explores the second half of the reading from John, focusing on Jesus' interaction with two inquirers. The questions and answers of this brief passage lead to deep reflection, the formation of enduring relationships, and ultimately the transformation of lives. All of this points to the value of creating space for reflection.

LISTENING FOR GOD'S WORD

The Hebrew Bible Isaiah 49:1–7 Dennis Ellis

¹Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples from far away! The Lord called me before I was born, while I was in my mother's womb he named me. ²He made my mouth like a sharp sword, in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished arrow, in his quiver he hid me away. ³And he said to me, "You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will be glorified." ⁴But I said, "I have labored in vain, I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity; yet surely my cause is with the Lord, and my reward with my God." ⁵And now the Lord says, who formed me in the womb to be his servant, to bring Jacob back to him, and that Israel might be gathered to him, for I am honored in the sight of the Lord, and my God has become my strength— ⁶he says, "It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the survivors of Israel; I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth."

⁷Thus says the Lord, the Redeemer of Israel and his Holy One, to one deeply despised, abhorred by the nations, the slave of rulers, "Kings shall see and stand up, princes, and they shall prostrate themselves, because of the Lord, who is faithful, the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you."

The Christian Testament 1 Corinthians 1:1–9

¹Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and our brother Sosthenes, ²To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: ³Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ⁴I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, ⁵for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— 6just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— 7so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. ³He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. ¹God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

The Litany of Writings (responsive)†

LEADER: In 1963 Dr. King said, "that the ultimate measure of humankind is never where we stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where we stand in times of

challenge and controversy."

PEOPLE: God give us courage to be counted among those who will work for justice.

LEADER: In 1963 Dr. King challenged southern white clergy by saying, "We will have to repent

in this generation not merely for the vitriolic words and actions of the bad people,

but for the appalling silence of the good people."

PEOPLE: God transform our stillness into action and our fear into courage.

LEADER: From the teachings of Jesus, Thoreau, and Gandhi, Dr. King taught us that

nonviolence is a powerful and just weapon because it "cuts without wounding

and ennobles the one who wields it. Nonviolence is a sword that heals."

PEOPLE: God heal our world through the works of our hands.

LEADER: Accepting the Nobel Peace Prize, Dr. King said that "unarmed truth and

unconditional love will have the final word in reality. Right, temporarily defeated, is

stronger than evil triumphant."

PEOPLE: God strengthen us to trust and abide in the power of your goodness.

LEADER: To the wealthiest nation in the world, in 1967 Dr. King offered an inclusive solution

to the problems of poverty and racism: "a radical restructuring of the architecture of

American society."

PEOPLE: God rearrange our priorities that all may receive in equal measure.

LEADER: And on the day before his death, Dr. King gave voice to the meaning of his vocation: "I

just want to do God's will."

PEOPLE: God call willing prophets out from this community to do your will on earth.

The Gospel John 1:29–42

²⁹The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! ³⁰This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' ³¹I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." ³²And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. ³³I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' ³⁴And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God." ³⁵The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, ³⁶and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!"

³⁷The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. ³⁸When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" ³⁹He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. ⁴⁰One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. ⁴¹He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed). ⁴²He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter).

LEADER: This is the Gospel of Christ.

PEOPLE: **Praise be to you, O Christ.**
