About our Worship: Today is Palm Sunday, the day we remember Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. There is tension between the joy of this day and the shadow that is cast upon it by the cross that is sure to come. Thus, we begin with children bringing palms forward and the singing of "All Glory, Laud and Honor" but end by singing these words, "Instead of palms a winding sheet will have to be unrolled, a carpet much more fit to greet the king a cross will hold." The sermon explores the irony found in this story and in Mark's telling of it. As we have been throughout this Lenten season, we are pushed to ponder what we learn about Jesus today and what the implications are for us.


