

About our Worship: On this Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost, our worship is shaped by texts that describe the great reversals God makes possible, as tears turn to shouts of joy, a nation returns home from exile, and a blind man sees again. It offers hope in a time when we need it and moves us to songs of rejoicing, especially when we realize that everyone is included in this reversal, even those who are often left out. The sermon offers a reflection on this latter dimension of hope and the challenges it brings. Like the disciples and many others around Jesus, we may be tempted to screen the people who come our way, and there are practical reasons to consider some boundaries, but the broader trajectory of Jesus' ministry calls us be hospitable to all.

²⁶For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. ²⁷Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. ²⁸For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

⁴⁶They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. ⁴⁷When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁸Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" ⁴⁹Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." ⁵⁰So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." ⁵²Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.
