

A bout our Worship: Today is the Second Sunday after the Epiphany, part of a season in which we reflect on the manifestation of light and love to the world through Christ. The texts include the familiar story of Jesus' first miracle or sign in John, the changing of water into wine at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. It is a story that functions as metaphor for the joyful abundance God will bring in Jesus, but it also contains an awkward exchange between Jesus and his mother, one in which he seems reluctant to help. The sermon will explore this theme of divine reluctance in the context of joyful abundance as we sing songs of hopeful longing and pray for God's realm to come in full. All of this seems appropriate for the weekend our nation celebrates the life and ministry of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. who spoke of the moral arc of the universe being long but bending toward justice (a quote of nineteenth-century abolitionist and Unitarian minister Theodore Parker).

¹For Zion's sake I will not keep silent, and for Jerusalem's sake I will not rest, until her vindication shines out like the dawn, and her salvation like a burning torch. ²The nations shall see your vindication, and all the kings your glory; and you shall be called by a new name that the mouth of the Lord will give. ³You shall be a crown of beauty in the hand of the Lord, and a royal diadem in the hand of your God. ⁴You shall no more be termed Forsaken, and your land shall no more be termed Desolate; but you shall be called My Delight Is in Her, and your land Married; for the Lord delights in you, and your land shall be married. ⁵For as a young man marries a young woman, so shall your builder marry you, and as the bridegroom rejoices over the bride, so shall your God rejoice over you.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

PEOPLE: Thanks be to God.

¹Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. ²You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. ³Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit.

⁴Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; ⁵and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; ⁶and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. ⁷To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. ⁸To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, ⁹to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, ¹⁰to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. ¹¹All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

LEADER: This is the Word of the Lord.

PEOPLE: Thanks be to God.

The Litany of Writings (responsive)

- LEADER: In 1963 Dr. King said, "that the ultimate measure of humankind is never where we stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where we stand in times of challenge and controversy."
- PEOPLE: God give us courage to be counted among those who will work for justice.
- LEADER: In 1963 Dr. King challenged southern white clergy by saying, "We will have to repent in this generation not merely for the vitriolic words and actions of the bad people, but for the appalling silence of the good people."
- PEOPLE: God transform our stillness into action and our fear into courage.
- LEADER: From the teachings of Jesus, Thoreau, and Gandhi, Dr. King taught us that nonviolence is a powerful and just weapon because it "cuts without wounding and ennobles the one who wields it. Nonviolence is a sword that heals."
- PEOPLE: God heal our world through the works of our hands.
- LEADER: Accepting the Nobel Peace Prize, Dr. King said that "unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the final word in reality. Right, temporarily defeated, is stronger than evil triumphant."
- PEOPLE: God strengthen us to trust and abide in the power of your goodness.
- LEADER: To the wealthiest nation in the world, in 1967 Dr. King offered an inclusive solution to the problems of poverty and racism: "a radical restructuring of the architecture of American society."
- PEOPLE: God rearrange our priorities that all may receive in equal measure.
- LEADER: And on the day before his death, Dr. King gave voice to the meaning of his vocation: "I just want to do God's will."
- PEOPLE: God call willing prophets out from this community to do your will on earth.


The Gospel

John 2:1–11

¹On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ²Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." ⁴And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." 5His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." 6Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. 8He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it. ⁹When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now." ¹¹Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

LEADER: This is the Gospel of Christ.
