The Stripping of the Altar

A highly vivid and dramatic way of showing forth the desolation and abandonment of the cross is through stripping the altar table and removing all textile hangings and candles. This practice dates from the seventh century and began for the utilitarian purpose of cleaning and washing the church in preparation of Easter. But the stark, bare church reflected so clearly the fitting tone of the occasion that the stripping became an evocative ceremony in its own right. The ceremony is done in complete silence.

*Depart in Silence

We ask that you leave the sanctuary without talking and in silent reflection on the Passion of Jesus Christ. You are invited to a soup and salad lunch after the service in the fellowship hall.
